GRANT PROJECT UPDATE Program Open Space (POS) Grant - Community Center Tot Lot and Walkway Roof Upgrades

The Town has applied to Carroll County Recreation and Parks and the Maryland Department of Natural Resources for funding to make improvements to the Community Center tot lot with some new equipment and to repair the walkway roof leading to the main entrance. We have received approval to move forward and will be seeking additional funding for the complete cost.

Town Waste Water Treatment Plant and I&I Efforts

The Town is currently working to assess efforts and requirements for updating our wastewater treatment. Several options will be considered as we work with the Maryland Department of the Environment (MDE) to discover our needs and develop a plan to address any finding.

We are also working on a separate workstream to investigate and remediate any inflow & infiltration (I&I) concerns that may be found within our sewerage flows. More information will be provided on both workstreams as they develop.

Stormwater in Union Bridge is regulated by law under Phase 1 Municipal Separate Storm Sewer (MS4) permits under EPA's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) administered through the Maryland Department of the Environment. WATER CONSERVATION INDOOR TIPS

- Scrape instead of prerinsing. Save yourself up to 20 gallons of water by scraping food off your dishes instead of pre-rinsing them.
- 2. Install high efficiency aerators. Installing an aerator on your bathroom or kitchen faucet and save about one gallon per minute each time you run them. An aerator reduces the flow from the faucet, and uses air to maintain good water pressure.
- Wash only full loads. Clothes & dish washers use about the same amount of energy and water regardless of the number of clothes or dishes inside, so run full loads whenever possible.
- 4. Let your dishwasher do the work. The

average dishwasher uses about ten gallons or less per load. Many kitchen faucets use the same amount of water by running for just four minutes.

- Use the microwave, a bowl of water, or place frozen food in fridge overnight instead of running the tap to thaw it out. You'll save about two gallons of water for each minute the faucet does not run.
- 6. **Replace older toilets** with a WaterSense labeled high efficiency toilet. Older toilets can use up to four times more water per flush.
- Regularly check for & repair water leaks. Even small leaks can waste hundreds to thousands of gallons of water a month. Many water leaks can be fixed by a do-it-yourself plumber, and repair parts are relatively inexpensive to purchase (\$5-20).
- 8. **Take shorter showers**. Each minute you shave off your shower time saves up to 2.5 gallons of water.
- 9. Select an Energy Starapproved appliances. They use 15-20 less gallons of water per load, and you will see savings on your energy costs too.
- 10. Know where your master shutoff valve is located. This could save water and prevent damage to your home.

WINTER SEASON REMINDERS

UNION BRIDGE CODE CHAPTER 130, SEC.4 (B2)

Owners or occupants of premises fronting on any street with paved sidewalks shall remove any snow or ice from the travelled portions of the sidewalk, to a width of at least 30", within 24 hours after snow or ice ceases to fall.

SNOW EMERGENCY ROUTES

Please be advised that Maryland Transportation Article 21-1119 authorizes law enforcement officers to ticket and tow vehicles parked in snow emergency routes when a snow emergency is declared. Violators of this transportation article could be fined \$70. Violators will also be responsible for the tow bill, if the vehicle is towed.

When a snow emergency is declared by the State Highway Administration, the Town of Union Bridge will post the declaration on the Town's website. Please remember to stay educated during snow events. Whenever you hear the weatherman call for snow, play it safe and just remove your vehicle from the street so you are not burdened later with cost associated with violations.

WINTER MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PATTERN SIDEWALKS

- 1. Sand or kitty litter may be used for traction.
- 2. Snow removal equipment should have a rubber edged blade.
- 3. We do not recommend the use of salt or snow melting product containing sodium chloride. In event that these products must be used, wash any residue from the concrete surface.
- 4. Avoid the use of ice picks or anything that may chip or damage the concrete surface.

<u>SNOW</u>

Main Street is a snow emergency route, <u>NO</u> <u>PARKING</u> is allowed when the snow emergency plan is in effect.

NO PARKING

On East Broadway from Lightner Street up to Bellevue and on Thomas Street when the emergency plan is in effect.

SNOW MAINTENANCE AROUND FIRE HYDRANTS

If you have a fire hydrant near your house, please keep it clear of snow so the fire department can quickly access it during an emergency.

IMPORTANT

If anyone notices anyone stealing water from hydrants or any unauthorized appropriation of water, please call the Town Hall at 410-775-2711.

SEWER LINE BLOCKAGES

RESIDENTS: If your sewer line becomes blocked, please contact the Town Hall at 410-775-2711 before calling a plumber.
