FROM THE MAYOR'S DESK

Street repair and paving were done before cold weather set in, but there is still a lot to do. Highway User Revenues (HURs) are holding up every town and city from performing needed street repairs. For those who may not understand how budgets are done, I will explain. Money from state, the county and towns are put in a certain category and must be used for that purpose. You cannot use the money somewhere else if that is how the state labels it. They keep a close eye on it and sometimes with all of the paperwork, you think "Is it worth it?" Municipalities statewide have lost a total of \$365 million in HURs since 2009. In FY2018 statewide. \$7.5 million was put back in the budget for 157 municipalities in the state. There are a lot of factors for how that money is divided. Some examples are road miles in Town and vehicles that are registered in Town, so it is very important that when people move into Town, they update their address as soon as possible.

The Mayor and Town Council had the honor of hosting the Carroll County Chapter of the Maryland Municipal League's Legislative Dinner in mid-December. We had all five County Commissioners, one State Senator plus three people from the Maryland Municipal League office in Annapolis. Dinner was at the Union Bridge Fire Hall and both the meal and service were great, as always. Delegate Haven Shoemaker was also here December 5th for the Christmas tree lighting in Town. The tree lighting was hosted by the Town and Union Bridge Business Association and was very well attended. Students from Elmer Wolfe Elementary School sang and did a wonderful job.

Starting in January 2018, the newsletter will be produced quarterly.

I am looking forward to the New Year. Happy New Year to ALL.

GRANT PROJECT UPDATE Inflow & Infiltration Engineering Feasibility Study

The Town has been awarded a SEARCH grant from the USDA to fund an engineering study to find recommendations for inflow and infiltration (I&I) mitigation in the Town which will increase the Town's waste water treatment plant (WWTP) capacity and allow for growth in our community. The Town is working with the USDA and our engineering firm to finalize our contract and will proceed in the spring of 2018.

Pre-Disaster Mitigation Grant for Emergency Generator

The Town has worked with the Maryland Emergency Management Agency (MEMA) to submit an application for funding a new Town emergency generator to keep our water treatment plant and Town Office running in the event of a power failure. MEMA has included our application with their state request to FEMA for approval. A decision should be made at the end of January 2018.

POS Grant for Community Center Upgrades

The Town has submitted a request for funding to assist with upgrading our Community Center with new windows, insulation and doors as well as other enhancements. The Town will also contribute funds if approved. A decision will be made very soon by the Department of Natural Resources Board of Public Works.

Community Parks and Playgrounds Grant for Tennis Courts

The Town has submitted an application to the MD Department of Natural Resources for a grant to resurface the Town's tennis courts and install new lighting as well as add the ability to play pickle ball, which is becoming a very popular sport. A decision is expected in May of 2018.

Stormwater in Union Bridge is regulated by law under Phase 1 Municipal Separate Storm Sewer (MS4) permits under EPA's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) administered through the Maryland Department of the Environment. WATER CONSERVATION INDOOR TIPS

- Scrape instead of prerinsing. Save yourself up to 20 gallons of water by scraping food off your dishes instead of pre-rinsing them.
- 2. Install high efficiency aerators. Installing an aerator

on your bathroom or kitchen faucet and save about one gallon per minute each time you run them. An aerator reduces the flow from the faucet, and uses air to maintain good water pressure.

- 3. Wash only full loads. Clothes and dishwashe rs use about the same amount of energy and water regardless of the number of clothes or dishes inside, so run full loads whenever possible.
- Let your dishwasher do the work. The average dishwasher uses about ten gallons or less per load. Many kitchen faucets use the same amount of water by running for just four minutes.
- 5. Use the microwave, a bowl of water, or place frozen food in fridge overnight instead of running the tap to thaw it out. You'll save about two gallons of water for each minute the faucet does not run.
- Replace older toilets with a WaterSense labeled high efficiency toilet.
 Older toilets can use up to four
- times more water per flush.
 7. Regularly check for & repair water leaks. Even small leaks can waste hundreds to thousands of gallons of water a month. Many water leaks can be fixed by a do-it-yourself plumber, and repair parts are relatively inexpensive to purchase (\$5-20).
- 8. **Take shorter showers.** Each minute you shave off your shower time saves up to 2.5 gallons of water.
- 9. Select an Energy Starapproved dish & clothes. They use 15-20 less gallons of water per load, and you will see savings on your energy costs too.
- 10. Know where your master shutoff valve is located. This could save water and prevent damage to your home.

WINTER SEASON REMINDERS

UNION BRIDGE CODE CHAPTER 130, SEC.4 (B2)

Owners or occupants of premises fronting on any street with paved sidewalks shall remove any snow or ice from the travelled portions of the sidewalk, to a width of at least 30", within 24 hours after snow or ice ceases to fall.

WINTER MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PATTER SIDEWALKS

- 1. Sand or kitty litter may be used for traction.
- 2. Snow removal equipment should have a rubber edged blade.
- 3. We do not recommend the use of salt or snow melting product containing sodium chloride. In event that these products must be used, wash any residue from the concrete surface.
- 4. Avoid the use of ice picks or anything that may chip or damage the concrete surface.

<u>SNOW</u>

Main Street is a snow emergency route, <u>NO</u> <u>PARKING</u> is allowed when the snow emergency plan is in effect.

NO PARKING

On East Broadway from Lightner Street up to Bellevue and on Thomas Street when the emergency plan is in effect.

SNOW MAINTENANCE AROUND FIRE HYDRANTS

If you have a fire hydrant near your house, please keep it clear of snow so the Fire Department can quickly access it during an emergency.

IMPORTANT

If anyone notices anyone stealing water from hydrants or any unauthorized appropriation of water, please call the Town Hall at 401-775-2711.

SEWER LINE BLOCKAGES

RESIDENTS: If your sewer line becomes blocked please contact the Town Hall at 410-775-2711 before calling a plumber.
