GRANT PROJECTS UPDATE

Wetlands Park Trail Extension

The Town of Union Bridge has been awarded grants from the Maryland State Highway Association's NRT program, Maryland Program Open Space program and Maryland Department of Housing and Community Development to complete our looped trail system and expand our parking area at the Little Pipe Creek Wetlands Park. This project will extend the length of the Little Pipe Creek Wetlands hiking and fitness trail an additional 1,100 feet (approximately). The Mayor and Council approved Stambaugh's Inc. to complete the project. The contractor will have 60 days to complete construction, at which time it will be open for public use. The existing trail is still open for use during construction.

Notifying those trusty neighbors or the Sheriff's Office of emergency contact information will also be beneficial if first responders need to get a hold of you while you are away or laying on the beach.

PROTECTING CARROLL COUNTY WATERS

When it rains or when snow melts, stormwater washes away pollutants that have accumulated on lawns, driveways, roads, highways, and parking lots. These pollutants flow overland into storm drain systems and ditches empting into local streams and rivers. When left untreated, these pollutants can impair local and downstream waterbodies used for swimming, fishing, aquatic life, and drinking water. You can help improve and protect the waters in Carroll County at home and in your municipality by learning more about stormwater pollution and prevention. Things you can do to help prevent stormwater runoff pollution:

*Use fertilizers sparingly and sweep up driveways, sidewalks, and gutters.

*Never dump anything down stormdrains, into ditches or streams.

*Compost your yard waste.

*Use the least toxic pesticides, follow labels, and learn how to prevent pest problems.

*Direct downspouts away from paved surfaces; consider a rain garden to capture runoff.

*Wash your car on the lawn or take it to a car wash instead of washing it on a paved driveway.

*Check your car for leaks and recycle your motor oil.

*Pick up after your pet.

Stormwater in Union Bridge is regulated by law under Phase 1 Municipal Separate Storm Sewer (MS4) permits under EPA's National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) administered through the Maryland Department of the Environment. HOUSE NUMBERS

Emergency response teams cannot find you if your house number is not clearly displayed on your home. Believe it or not, a majority are not visible from the street. It's even worse at night. A badly displayed number or no number at all can cost you precious time in an emergency. If you have not already done so, please place your house number on your home. The bigger the numbers the better. Help us to be able to locate you when you need our assistance.

PHONE NUMBERS

The town is requesting all property owners submit a phone number to the Clerk-Treasurer. If there is an emergency a town official may need to contact you.

LEAF PICKUP

The town will again offer leaf pickup. Please call the Town Hall to schedule a pickup October through December.

WINTER MONTHS

Be sure to drain all outdoor water hoses and temporary water lines. Check all outdoor faucets to make sure they are

turned off and are not leaking.

SEWER LINE BLOCKAGES

RESIDENTS: If your sewer line becomes blocked please contact the Town Hall at 410-775-2711 before calling a plumber.

WINTER MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PATTERN SIDEWALKS

- 1. Sand or kitty litter may be used for traction.
- 2. Snow removal equipment should have a rubber edged blade.
- 3. We do not recommend the use of salt or snow melting product containing sodium chloride. In the event that these products must be used wash any residue from the concrete surface when feasible.
- 4. Avoid the use of ice picks or anything that may chip or damage the concrete surface.

REMINDER: UNION BRIDGE CODE CHAPTER 130, SEC. 4 (B2)

Owners or occupants of premises fronting on any street with paved sidewalks shall remove any snow or ice from the traveled portions of the sidewalk, to a width of at least 30", within 24 hours after snow or ice ceases to fall.

SNOW

Main Street is a snow emergency route.

NO PARKING is allowed when the snow emergency plan is in effect.

NO PARKING on East Broadway from Lightner Street up to Bellevue and on Thomas Street up to Bellevue when the snow emergency plan is in effect.
